In particular, please describe your community's efforts to set-up or improve the Coordinated Access governance structure, including processes to ensure that policies and protocols, as approved by the governance group(s), are being implemented across the system as intended to achieve desired results.

Our community has been working hard to achieve the Reaching Home minimum requirements and improve the Coordinated Access governance structure and ensure that policies and protocols are being implemented across the system. All main service providers receiving funding from the Designated Community funding stream are using Coordinated Access to refer clients to the appropriate housing resource. We still have some smaller service providers to bring online and have trained in HIFIS but this work will continue as the Coordinated Access system grows in our community. As number of access points increase, we can ensure there are no "side doors" to housing and any individuals and families experiencing housing challenges can connect with organizations in our community that provide them with the appropriate resources. Access points know where to connect people to receive housing services in a coordinated manner. The Housing First program offers help with warm referrals, rent subsidies and if necessary, case managers. As we move toward a fully implemented Coordinated Access system, we are already seeing the benefits of streamlining service delivery in our community and the positive outcomes related to preventing and reducing homelessness. While we do have a Unique Identifier List of individuals in our community waiting for housing placement, we do not consider it complete or comprehensive. Cape Breton Community Housing Association (CBCHA) operates the largest emergency shelter in our community, and being a relatively small designated community, we have 2 other shelters but CBCHA provides the largest number of emergency beds and also manages our Housing First program. Our Unique Identifier List started during one of our Point in Time Counts and has been maintained by the emergency shelter and Housing First team of CBCHA. This is a housing waiting list for clients who use the emergency shelter and the housing first program. Joining the Noval Scotia Provincial HIFIS network and the partnership formed with Affordable Housing Association of NS (AHANS) to help train more of our local service providers to use HIFIS will create a more complete and comprehensive By Names List for our community. Being located in a smaller community also provides an advantage to the C.A manager, the governance committee and the C.A working group. Most of the organizations involved with Coordinated Access program know each other and have previous working relationships. The C.A working group and governance committee can implement policies and protocols across the system to help achieve the desired result more easily and quickly then a larger community. Having the local service providers part of the C.A working group provides an avenue for feedback and input from community partners to the C.A governance committee. The COVID-19 pandemic created issues that slowed down the progress of our implementation as all of our local organizations and service providers quickly re-focused the majority of their efforts on helping the communities homeless and at risk of homelessness through the pandemic but with case numbers decreasing and vaccination numbers

ncreasing, we are refocussing our attention back towards Coordinated Access implementation. The Community Entity in Halifax (AHANS) has provided invaluable support not only in technical expertise but also in sharing lessons learned, examples erms of reference and policies/protocols for our community to use as guides in our own implementation process.






