1. ABOUT PiT COUNT

- Point-in-Time (PiT) Count is a community-level measurement of sheltered and unsheltered homelessness, which provides the national picture of magnitude of homelessness.
- The results of these counts are used to demonstrate resource needs in communities and support the development of programs and policies that aim to prevent, reduce, and end homelessness.

1.1 Point in-Time Count 2024

- comprised of both an enumeration and a survey component.
- a. PiT Count Enumeration: Count of how many people experienced homelessness in a community on a **single night**.

✓ November 21, 2024
- b. Survey on Homelessness: a set of standardized questions administered directly to individuals experiencing homelessness. It collected the information on their demographics and experiences. Survey administration extended up to **one month**.

- *Shelters & Transitional Housing* (based on length of stay): supporting stay less than one year

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1.3 Unsheltered Homelessness

- Included people sleeping in places unfit for human habitation, such as, streets, alleys, parks, transit stations, abandoned buildings, vehicles, ravines & other outdoor locations where people experiencing homelessness are known to sleep.
- A further subset within the unsheltered enumeration was encampments, which are outdoor locations with a group of tents, makeshift shelters or other long-term settlement, where two or more individuals are staying. Encampments were reported separately due to their recent rise in visibility across the country, as well as the unique experiences of those staying there.
- *Observed homelessness:* To enumerate those that are apparently homeless but did not participate in the screening questions. It included people who are unable to respond, e.g., if they were sleeping or if there were language barriers. The criteria for including someone as observed homeless was identified. For example, if they were bedded down in an unsheltered location and had many belongings with them

1.4 Hidden Homelessness:

- It included people living temporarily with others without the guarantee of continued access to a safe and permanent residence.
- They were not currently experiencing homelessness but were at risk of it.
- Given that it was not possible to measure or count the extent of hidden homelessness using PiT Count methodology, it was not a core location. It was an optional location for Surveys only.
- The count of individuals experiencing hidden homelessness was not included in the total enumeration.

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

- As per PiT Count data, there is a 47.2% increase in homelessness from the previous count.

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




IN LAST ONE YEAR:

- 64 % individuals experiencing homelessness have used Shelter Services, and 36 % did not.
- 47% individuals experiencing homelessness have used Transitional Housing services, and 53 % did not.
- At some point in time,
 - 46% individuals have stayed overnight in an unsheltered in public space
 - 41% individuals have stayed overnight in an encampment
 - 34% individuals have stayed overnight in a vehicle.
- 30% individuals were sent to Hotel/Motel funded by City/homelessness program.
- 31% of Surveyed individuals experiencing homelessness have been to jail, prison, or other correctional facility.

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

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













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
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
14. What happened that caused you to lose your housing most recently?



14c. How long ago did that happen (that you lost your housing most recently)? (Best estimate.)



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
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

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Recommendations:

- I. **Prioritize Vulnerable Populations:** Focus on chronic homelessness, youth, and families with children. Expand outreach for unsheltered individuals and provide tailored interventions such as mental health support and substance use.
- II. **Expand Shelter and Transitional Housing:** Increase shelter capacity and promote diversion programs. Invest in youth-specific shelters with services including trauma-informed care, education support, and pathways to employment. Strengthen eviction prevention programs with rental assistance, legal aid, and mediation services. Develop more transitional housing options with case management to help individuals move toward permanent housing.
- III. **Invest in Long-Term Housing Solutions:** Design and implement "supportive living villages" or communities that are specifically designed for people with personalized needs (physical mobility, mental health, substance abuse). These could be self-contained neighborhoods or apartment complexes providing permanent housing with integrated services that address health, employment, and other social needs. Ensuring access to affordable housing and long-term support services, making housing stability a priority.
- IV. **Housing First Approach:** Prioritize stable housing first, with enhanced funding for targeted outreach and resources to address underlying issues like affordability and safety. Develop more positions in housing support services to help individuals navigate complex systems, ensuring they can maintain stable housing and move toward long-term stability. Ensure comprehensive case management to address barriers and to connect individuals with housing, health services, and job opportunities.
- V. **Collaborative Partnerships:** Build strong partnerships with local governments, nonprofits, healthcare providers, schools, meal providers, and harm reduction centers to ensure a coordinated, community-wide response. Engage landlords to create affordable housing opportunities and offer support to both tenants and landlords throughout the rental process.
- VI. **Track Progress and Evaluate Outcomes:** Strengthen Coordinated Access Systems to match individuals with appropriate services and resources. Use regular PIT counts and data tracking to monitor progress, evaluate outcomes, and adjust strategies as needed.
